Learn about the clarinet!

Part of the woodwind family, the name clarinet means "little trumpet," as the first clarinets had a tone similar to that of a trumpet!

Clarinets are made from specially chosen varieties of wood or, for some student instruments, composite material or plastic resin. The clarinet uses a single reed which vibrates to generate the instrument's sound.

Have you heard a digital accordion before?

An electronic musical instrument that is similar to a traditional accordion (bellows, bass buttons for the left hand, and a small pianostyle keyboard (or buttons) for the right hand, and register switches). You can also produce a range of non-accordion sounds, such as orchestral instruments, pipe organ, piano, guitar, and so on.

It can be played with digital sounds, acoustically, or a mix of both!

Bridge & Wolak play music from a variety of styles, often arranging it themselves!

Film music



Original music written specifically to accompany a film. The majority of scores are orchestral works (or classical music), but many scores are also influenced by jazz, rock, pop, blues, new-age and ambient music, and a wide range of ethnic and world music styles!

Did you know that music in film use to replace talking?



Music originating from Europe which is not pop music or jazz or folk music. It is music which has been written by composers who have studied the art of composition.



Type of traditional and generally rural music that originally was passed down through families and other small social groups. Typically, folk music, like folk literature, lives in oral tradition; it is learned through hearing rather than reading.



A music genre that originated in the African-American communities of New Orleans, United States, in the late 19th and early 20th centuries, and developed from roots in blues and ragtime. Since the 1920s Jazz Age, jazz has become recognized as a major form of musical expression.



Ennio Morricone's "Love theme" from *Cinema Paradiso*



Cinema Paradiso is a 1988 Italian drama film. The plot of Cinema Paradiso is loosely based on the story of the Protti family, who have owned a movie theatre in Mantua, Italy, since 1904. The music for the film, including the "Love theme," was composed by Ennio Morricone – was an Italian composer, orchestrator, conductor, and trumpet player who wrote music in a wide range of styles.

Morricone composed more than 400 scores for cinema and television, as well as more than 100 classical works!

Gankino Horo - traditional Bulgarian folk dance

Gankino Horo, arranged by Bridge & Wolak, is a very fast Bulgarian folk dance. It is danced by men & women in a circle, counterclockwise, with their feet moving rapidly. But the most unique thing about this dance is its rhythm.

Most western pieces have 2, 3 or 4 beats in the measure... like a waltz [music: 1,2,3, 1,2,3] or a march [music:1,2, 1,2]. This piece has 11 beats to the bar!

To follow along while listening, clap or snap on all the 1's. [music, 1234 123 1234], to keep up with the rhythm!
